SCRIPTURE: Luke 2:1-14 "To Whom do Angels Appear?"

Augustus' assumption of power brought an end to endless conflict and ushered in an era of international peace. Under the mantle of his imperial power, all nations, tribes, and languages hailed him as a god. Because the world's attention was locked on Caesar, it would have missed the birth of an even greater King had it not been for the angel's sermon. Marvel at this: the angel didn't speak his heavenly rhetoric before the roman senate. He didn't appear to Caesar's legions. He found shepherds, the lowest and humblest of men, to hear and bear witness to God's birth. In the same way God elects and saves us by grace apart from

what the world counts as worthy. Hear and believe that He is well pleased with you. *Glory to God in the highest! Amen.*

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 23:34-39 "Accepting or Rejecting Christ?"

We're tempted to boast that we wouldn't have made the same mistakes that men have made in the past. 'If Christ were born in my day,' we think, 'I would have followed Him no matter what. I would not have deserted Him or cried out for His crucifixion.' These words are born of sinful pride, not the Spirit. Instead of receiving Jesus as Lord or St. Stephan as a prophet, stubborn and prideful human flesh rejected them. Do not boast that you've accepted Christ, dear saints. Boast instead that Christ has accepted you to hear and believe His Gospel. By His grace and mercy, your hard heart is overcome so you can be counted as God's child by humble faith that receives what God gives. Thank You for accepting me according to Your grace. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: John 21:19-24 "What Is It to You?"

What did the Christians think when St. John was approaching his 95th or 96th year on earth? 'Will John really remain until Jesus comes again?' No doubt John chuckled and laughed at their wonderment over his age since he had been spared the more violent deaths of his apostolic brothers. What could his age mean? That doesn't concern us. To some God gives the honor of working diligently without the pain of persecution. To others he gives the glory of martyrdom. It's not for us to seek one or the other, but rather to commend ourselves into God's tender keeping. The greater will of God is that we believe what our fathers in the faith have confessed and preached. We leave all else to God's good and gracious will. *Your will be done, O Lord. Amen.*

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 2:13-18 "Why This Bitter Hatred?"

SCRIPTURE: John 1:1-14 "In the Beginning"

SCRIPTURE: Hebrews 1:1-12 "Imprint of Nature"

The old devilish attacks of Arianism and Gnosticism are never far from us. Folks who read their Bibles in a "new way" find twisted satisfaction in claiming that the Scriptures never definitively say that Jesus is divine as the Father is divine. They'll come up with new ways of speaking of Jesus' humanity too, saying that He only appeared to be born, to suffer, die, and be raised on the third day. Let the Holy Spirit cast these worn-out heresies far from your mind. See what great pains He takes to assure you of the exactness of the imprint of divine nature upon the Son who has become our Savior. No angel of heaven is as exulted as He. And yet, find the greatest comfort in His humility to saye you.

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 132 "For David's Sake"

Keep my mind and heart free from all heresy. Amen.

As the Israelites ascended and passed through Jerusalem's gates to worship, they would chant psalms such as this. Their kings were wicked. Their priests were corrupt. Their leaders promoted the idolatry of the nations with more vigor than they promoted the worship of the true God. When they were tempted with despair, the Spirit made them remember the promise the Lord spoke to David, that His Seed would sit on the divine throne forever (vs. 12). Therefore the people sang, "For the sake of Your servant David, do not turn away the face of Your Christ." On Christmas, the face of Christ has come, and today the crown of His righteousness, the power of His Word and sacrament, shines over His people making them holy. Let us go to His dwelling place. Amen.
