# Around the Word Devotions + the week of February 18-24, 2024

### THEME OF THE WEEK: He Suffered Temptation by Satan

Satan brings temptation to man. It has been this way since the 8th day of creation and will be this way until the Lord comes again in His glory. He tempts us to be what we are not. He tempts us to despise our humanness. He tempts us to go against God's good and holy Word for our lives. He tempts us to despair of God's gracious mercy, and His everlasting love and forgiveness. Satan tempts in order to destroy us. And so our Lord takes on our flesh in order to resist what we could not. Tempted like us in every way except without sin, Jesus resists the temptations of the evil one in order for Him to reach the cross blemish free. So that He can be the sacrifice that wins salvation over this evil foe of ours and the One who forgives us when we fall into temptation.

### SCRIPTURE: Matthew 4:1-11—Tempted

"Why are you hungry?" Satan asks Jesus. "Just make some bread with your divine powers and stop your belly from rumbling. Or more to the point, why do you even have a belly? Why are you standing in flesh and bone? Why have you subjected Yourself to becoming man?" It's a valid question. Why would God become man? We know the answer to that one, to save us from our sins. But notice something in that first temptation, it is eerily similar to the first temptation in the Garden of Eden. Not the temptation to eat, but the temptation to be like God and only like God, to despise humanity. Adam and Eve failed miserably. We do too, as we are always reaching for the stars, not content being what God made us to be. But Jesus did not count equality with God something to be grasped. He succeeded where we fail. Jesus, thank You for taking on the form of a servant. Amen.

### SCRIPTURE: Psalm 32—Blessed Are The Forgiven

### SCRIPTURE: 2 Corinthians 6:1-10—A Favorable Time

### SCRIPTURE: Genesis 3:1-24—Mankind Falls

"Satan despises humanity. He despises anything of the temporal, anything that you can touch and taste and see and hear. He is a Gnostic, in that way, believing that the temporal is the antithesis of good, and so his temptation is to have Adam and Eve deny their humanity and be like God. For Man to have a knowledge of death they must die. And so to succumb to this temptation means that man will be doomed to destruction. Yet our Lord would not see the pinnacle of His creation be damned. And so the first promise is given, the first Gospel: the Seed of the woman will crush Satan. What poetic justice! God will use the very thing most despised by Satan in order to defeat him. He will take on our flesh and crush the devil's head with a crucified flesh and bloody heel. O Christ, thank You for crushing the head of Satan for our sake. Amen.

### SCRIPTURE: Luke 22:24-34—Peter's Promise

Peter promises that he will never deny Jesus, but will follow Him all the way to death's door. It's a valiant promise, one that each catechumen and each new member vows: never to fall away from the faith. But I don't think that Peter gets the point of what Jesus had previously said. You see, while Jesus is talking about the greatest one being the servant, He is talking about Himself serving humanity through His death. And yet Peter, wanting to be seen as great, boastfully promises to stand alongside Jesus to the cross. That is a common thing for the sinner, wanting to number himself with Jesus. Better to let Jesus number Himself with us. Meaning, better to let Jesus do all of the work of saving and forgiving and granting life. If there is anything given to us to do in regard to salvation, it is only to receive it. Let us be content in that! Servant of all, continue to serve me all the days of my life. Amen.

### SCRIPTURE: James 1:2-15—Count It All Joy

There is a difference between joy and happiness. Our English makes them synonyms, but I would argue that they are separate concepts. It is the way in which the Christian can be joyful at the funeral of his wife without being happy. The joy is in Christ and His victory over the grave. Tears may stain the cheek, and death may take away all happiness, but not even the grave can steal away the Christian's joy. And so in the same way, when the Christian is enduring the various trials of this world because he is a Christian, he counts it a joy. In the midst of persecution, the Christian joyfully bears his cross. In the midst of trial, the Christian knows that God's power is made perfect in weakness, therefore when we are weak, God is strong to save. And save He does! Almighty God, grant to us the pure joy that comes from Your Son, even as we endure the trials of this life. Amen.

### SCRIPTURE: Matthew 9:9-13—St. Matthew

Matthew was a tax collector, which means he was a sinner. I know, I know, we are all sinners, but in Jesus' time a tax collector exemplified the sinner among sinners. He was a cheat and thief, while also being a traitor by working for the Romans. Matthew was hated by all, and yet he was called by Jesus to be an apostle and evangelist, not because of anything inherent in him, but because of the mercy of Christ. Matthew reminds us that Jesus only dines with sinners. If you are not a sinner, you don't have a place at His table. That is not to say that He approves of sin. It means that a person does not have to make himself worthy before Jesus shares a meal with Him and speaks a work of forgiveness in his ears. For if we had to first make ourselves worthy of Christ's presence, the things we receive would not be gifts given by Him. *Great Physician, I am sick and in need of You. Heal me according to Your mercy. Amen.* 

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
