THEME OF THE WEEK: The Second Coming of Christ

“At midnight there was a cry, ‘Here is the bridegroom! Come out to meet him.’” The summons will come at a time when everyone least expects it. Heavens and earth will be shaken. Mankind will be seized with dismay. Drunkenness, dissipation, and the cares of life will threaten to weigh the hearts of the faithful down into the slumber of unbelief. And yet the Bridegroom himself has assured us that that day will come upon the unwary like a trap. No one will miss it. No one will be left behind. When that day comes, how will you receive it? By God’s grace you will lift your heads in joy knowing your redemption has come!

SUN

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 25:1-13 Wisely Spending the Time

Wisdom is justified by her deeds. The five wise virgins took advantage of the daytime to find oil for their lamps in anticipation of the Bridegroom’s arrival. In the way you are called to exercise wisdom while you wait for Jesus’ coming on the Last Day. The buyers and sellers are open. In fact, their goods are bought without money. The price for the oil has been paid in advance by the sufferings and death of the Bridegroom himself. Spend your time wisely. Go to church. Go to Bible Study. Open the Scriptures and find comfort in the promises. When the sleep of death comes, rest secure knowing that you will be awakened with joy when you hear the Redeemer’s voice. *“Grant me the oil of your grace and faith to prepare for Jesus’ coming.” Amen.*

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 103 How God Deals with Us

If only we could only believe this psalm we would never be dismayed. How often do we interpret affliction as signs and tokens of God’s deep displeasure toward us? When we fall through temptation into sin, our hearts are frightened with the thought that God cannot possibly save someone who so cheaply treats his grace. In the tribunal of our conscience the verdict is always against us. There’s no room for mercy. And yet, what did we just hear? “The Lord will not always hide nor will he keep his anger forever. He does not deal with us according to our sins, nor repay us according to our iniquities.” The Spirit meets the devil’s accusations with this promise to save you. *“Cause me to remember your Son in times of spiritual affliction.” Amen.*

TUE

SCRIPTURE: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11 Children of the Light

Imagine going to bed thinking there’s no one coming over and no possibility that you’ll hear someone knocking at the door. Hearing a knock in the middle of the night and the door’s hinges creaking as someone lets himself in is terrifying! So it will be with those who do not anticipate Christ’s coming. Now imagine that you know the person you love most is coming. Being awakened by the same sounds in the darkness brings a whole different experience. Instead of terror there’s joy. So it is for you. Jesus won’t come as a stern judge for you. “For God has not destined us for wrath.” He comes to bring you life, comfort, joy and peace. *“Heavenly Father, keep me a child to the light by never taking the light of your gospel from my heart.” Amen.*

SCRIPTURE: Isaiah 65:17-19 New Heavens and Earth

These heavens and earth are tired, old, and worn out. Like with a frayed and threadbare garment we can see the world groaning in anticipation of renewal. Nature has been despoiled. The waters are tainted. The air is poisoned. Society is in shambles. Men no longer fear God nor know how to love their neighbors. Everything is subjected to futility. God be praised that he has delivered this great promise to us today. He comes to create a new heavens and earth and the old ways of sin and death will not even be remembered. Weeping and sorrow will cease. The Lord’s joy and gladness in and for us will give us eternal life. Christ is coming soon, dear saints. Pray he comes quickly. *“Grant me patience to wait for your Son’s coming, heavenly Father.” Amen.*

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 5:13-16 Salt of the Earth

No other philosophy or religion has the Christian’s way of anticipating the end of all things while at the same moment preparing to wait. People notice. They expect the Christians to act suicidally like other doomsday cults, but we don’t. They expect us to fall into lassitude and finally give up the vigil to go extinct, but we don’t. This excited anticipation and longsuffering patience is slat to the drab flavors of this world’s apathy. Don’t let them tell you otherwise. Don’t let them shame you into silence. Be light in this benighted world by confessing your faith in Christ and happily giving the reason for the hope within you. *“Grant me your Holy Spirit, O Lord, to give me courage to confess and show my great love for you.” Amen.*

SCRIPTURE: Revelation 21:1-7 “Behold I am making all things new!”

The dwelling place of God is indeed with man through the incarnation of Christ, the Son of God, who came to take away the sin of the world. Since that time of his first coming, Jesus has remained with us whenever we hear his Word or receive his Sacraments. We can’t see him, but he is personally and fully present. When the last day comes, our eyes will catch up with our ears and hearts. We will see what we have long believed and hoped for. Don’t be afraid. Don’t fear the judgment. You have already passed from death to life in Baptism. Your name has been recorded in the Book of Life. You have been prepared together with the whole church to be the pure and beautiful Bride of Christ. *“Grant me to always wait for your coming, O Lord.” Amen.*

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 27 or 97 One Thing

What do you seek after? The flesh seeks after its own comfort and glory. It seeks after pleasure and riches. But these idols are as fleeting as the world around us. They will not last. They will be destroyed. The psalmist teaches us that the Christian’s spirit, the new life given to us by grace and faith in Christ, turns away from idols to seek after the Lord and his presence alone. We find it in the Divine Service here on earth. We find it in the absolving words of the pastor on Sunday morning. Our hearts seek to see this presence, not only believe it. This is what we call hope. It is turned from the perishing world and directed towards Christ alone. *“You have said, “Seek my face.” My heart says to you, “Your face, LORD, do I seek.” Amen.*

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
