Around the Word Devotions + the week of April 18-24, 2021

THEME OF THE WEEK: He is Risen to Be the Shepherd of the Church

Jesus was raised to shepherd His flock. He stands now in the LORD's strength to protect, guide, and uphold the flock for whom He gave His life. This picture of the flock saved by the dying Shepherd strengthens our faith and comforts our conscience. This week we consider only a handful of Bible passages concerning Christ the good Shepherd, and in them consolation overflows. God be praised!

SUN

SCRIPTURE: John 10:11-16, An Exceptionally Good Shepherd

We are the wandering sheep gone astray. Jesus is the exceptionally Good Shepherd who knows the sheep, calls us by name, finds us in the wilderness and carries us home, gives us rest in green pastures and refreshment in the cool waters, and more. This Good Shepherd lays down His life for the sheep. This Good Shepherd is also the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. Like a silent Lamb He bears our sins and carries our sorrows, and they crush Him. He dies for us, His sheep, the people of His pasture. Can you imagine it? Would He devote that sacred head for such a worm as I? Indeed, He has! O Good Shepherd, thank You for laying down Your life to rescue Your people. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 70, The Race to Hurt or Help You

This Psalm paints the picture of a person being pursued and chased down. Your enemies are after you, and you are praying they would not find you. "Let them be ashamed and confounded who seek my life" (70:2). The LORD is also coming for you, and you plead with Him to hurry. "Make haste, O God, to deliver me! O LORD, do not delay." (70:1, 5). Our lives are always lives in trouble. The world, our own flesh, and the devil threaten our good and all the gifts of God. So we are always in need of help and rescue. Because of all the troubles of this life we are always praying Psalm 70, O Lord, please hurry. You are my help and my deliverer. O LORD, do not delay. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: 1 Peter 2:21-25, Jesus Our Example and Savior

Peter's letter gives hope to the sufferer. It reminds us, first, that Jesus also suffered. He is our example; He shows us how to do it. But He is much more than an example. It turns out Jesus' suffering was the suffering that we deserved. He "bore our sins in His own body on the tree" of the cross. His suffering is the suffering we deserved. His cross is the punishment our sins deserved. But Jesus, the Shepherd and Overseer of our souls is there for us. God be praised! By His stripes we are healed. O Lord, we give You thanks that You suffered patiently for sinners, for us. Cleanse us by Your blood. Keep us as Your holy flock. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Ezekiel 34:11-16, Those are My Sheep

This entire chapter is worth reading. Through the prophet the LORD is thundering against the false teachers and unfaithful rulers of Israel. The rulers and teachers were meant to care for the LORD's people like a careful shepherd. They failed. They abused and troubled the people for their own gain. The LORD will punish the terrible rulers, but then-here's the good news- the LORD Himself will take up His rod and staff to shepherd the people. "T" is the key word. "Indeed IMyself will search for My sheep.... I will seek out... I will bring... I will feed." O LORD, seek us, find us, rescue us, feed us, tend to us with Your mercy and kindness, and bring us at last to the eternal joys of Your kingdom.

SCRIPTURE: John 5:22-30 From Life to Death to Life

The day is coming soon when all in the grave will hear the voice of Jesus and be raised. What a tremendous day! What a terrifying day! Following the resurrection is the judgment. But here is another wonderful mystery revealed to us in this text: there is no judgment for the Christian. "Most assuredly, I say to you, he who hears My word and believes in Him who sent Me has everlasting life, and shall not come into judgment, but has passed from death into life" (5:24). God be praised! For us wanderers through the valleys and shadows of death, the resurrection of life is coming soon. *O Lord Jesus Christ, You conquered death for*

us. Come quickly to rescue us from the pangs of death and the grave, and bring us to eternal life. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Hebrews 13:20, 21 Our God of War and Peace

"The LORD is a man of war" (Exodus 15:3). He has gone to battle, not against you, but for you. He is your champion, and all your enemies are scattered on the field. Sin: forgiven (Colossians 1:14). Death: disarmed (1 Corinthians 15:54-57). The devil: destroyed (Hebrews 2:14-15). The Lord of war is, for us, the "God of peace" (Hebrews 13:20). He has brought Jesus up from the dead for our justification (Romans 4:25), for our forgiveness, life, and salvation, and in Him we are complete. We give You thanks, heavenly Father, for the resurrection of Your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, whose resurrection gives us grace and peace. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 23: My Shepherd? The LORD

My shepherd? The LORD. He is the One who provides my needs. He is the One who guards and protects me. He is the One who provides everything I need for this life and the life to come. He is the One who defends me against all danger. His rod is my comfort. His staff is my peace. His cross is my hope. His death is my life. His mercy is my confidence. His name is my righteousness. His word is my wisdom. Even in the midst of so many enemies, He prepares a table for feasting and joy. Even in the midst of so many dangers He calls me His own. Even in the valley and shadow His presence and promise give light and life. Goodness follows me. Mercy chases me down. His house is my eternal dwelling. O Lord, now and forever, be my good Shepherd. Amen.
