BLESS YOURSELF WITH THE HOLY CROSS AND SAY:

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

SAY THE APOSTLES' CREED

Around the Word Devotions + the week of April 9-15, 2023

THEME OF THE WEEK: He is Risen to Overcome Death

"The old has gone and the new has come." So Paul reminds us in 2 Corinthians 5:17. What we once were, what we were once captive to, what we once thought, said, and did...these are all dead and gone. We are crucified with Jesus, buried with Him and dead. We have all this in baptism, for all who are baptized into Jesus and believe in Him are dead to sin. Though we die to sin, we are alive to God in righteousness, for our Lord Jesus did not stay dead. He has been raised to new, never-ending life - and we baptized along with Him. Now we are alive and we live in His righteousness.

SUN

SCRIPTURE: Mark 16:1-8 "Trembling and Astonishment"

This is a beautifully simple message: Jesus is alive, not dead. They had seen Him crucified, dead, and buried – but now the tomb is empty! Death couldn't hold Him and the grave's grip is broken. That message is for you too. Since death cannot hold Jesus it cannot hold you. You belong to him. The rolled-back stone shows you exactly what *your* grave will look like on the Last Day: open and empty. This is a beautifully simple message that is simply beautiful! *Lord Jesus*, gladden our hearts with the good news of Your victory over death! Amen.



SCRIPTURE: Psalm 2 "Truly Free!"

The second psalm tells of the world's rage and unbelieving plotting against the Savior. Unbelief wants to throw off God and His Son, seeing God's Word as nothing but bondage and cords. Even as those who have been brought from the darkness to the light, that same temptation lingers in our hearts: ignoring His Word, rejecting His Supper, and being done with Him altogether, as though His gifts were burdens. Repent and believe the good news that in Jesus, the Son of God, you are truly free, even called beloved sons and daughters! *Lord, we are Yours! Save us! Amen.*

TUE

SCRIPTURE: 1 Corinthians 5:6-8 "A New Lump"

Paul speaks of God's command to the Israelites that they remove all yeast from their homes in order to properly celebrate the Passover. But what if some was missed? What if some was forgotten in a crack or crevice? That yeast is a picture of sin. It works its way through everything and everyone. There's no safe hiding place and it cannot be contained in just one part. The good news is that Jesus has cleansed us of all sin by His blood! He has made us fit for the eternal festival in His household! *Lord Jesus, we give You all thanks and praise! Amen.*

WED

SCRIPTURE: Isaiah 52:13-15 "For the Joy Set Before Him"

Beyond recognition - that's the extent to which the Savior had to be beaten for sins. Beyond recognition. Let that sink in. Your filthy thoughts, your self-serving actions, your sharp words. They are not harmless, and they are not free. They cost Jesus everything, yet He freely laid down His life in death as payment. Willingly. For the joy set before Him He endured the cross for you. He endured the beating, the shame, death, and the grave for you! Lord Jesus, we give You thanks for Your suffering and death. Give us the joy of Your salvation. Amen.

THU

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 28:1-8 "On the First Day of the Week"

On the first day of the week there was light. The Father spoke and flooded light into the darkness. On the first day of the week light again came into the world to redeem it from the death of sin. Jesus stepped out of the tomb on that Sunday morning and light flooded the darkness. He abolished death (for you) and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel (to you)! Darkness and death no longer possess you because Jesus has called you out of darkness into His marvelous light. Thank You, Jesus, for bringing us into Your marvelous, unending light! Amen.

FRI

SCRIPTURE: 1 Peter 1:3-12 "Subsequent Glories"

Our flesh would have us despise the crosses Jesus gives us for our good and throw them off. Peter tells us that our faith is being tested and tried, to refine it. Like Jesus, our Lord, we suffer first and then enjoy the subsequent glories. Now is suffering, mockery, and shame for His name's sake. Yet we know that His promise of glory is as sure as done, for He does not lie. Yes, we are grieved by various trials, but we are obtaining the outcome of our faith, the salvation of our souls. Blessed are You. O Lord, for Your mercy toward us! Amen.

SAT

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 113 "Who Is Like the Lord Our God?"

Who is like the Lord our God? Who raises up the poor from the dust of death? Who lifts up the needy from the sorrows of their sinfulness? Who makes the poor and needy to sit with princes, treating them like royalty?! Who cares about the barren woman to give her a home and bestow upon her the gift of life created in her womb? None. The false gods are vain and empty. The true God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit is the One who serves His people, the Giver of all things, even your salvation. Almighty and gracious God: we praise Your name! Amen.
