Around the Word Devotions + the week of December 20-26, 2020

THEME OF THE WEEK: The Birth of the Christ-Child

Conceived and knit together in the secret depths of His mother's womb, the eternal Lord entered His created realm as part of His created realm. For nine months His frame was being made in secret, "intricately woven in the depths of the earth." "Then stepped forth the Lord of all from His pure and kingly hall." The Virgin has conceived and given birth to a Son. "All praise to Thee eternal God. Who clothed in garb of flesh and blood, dost take a manger for Thy throne. while worlds on worlds are Thine alone." "This is Christ, our God and Lord, Who in all need shall aid afford; He will Himself your Savior be from all your sins to set you free."

SCRIPTURE: John 1:19-28 A Voice Cries in the Wilderness

Sin makes the way of the Lord crooked and broken. Fissures of guilt and cracks of iniquity make the path impassible. What can pass between the Lord and His fallen creation? His people try to make their own paths of works to the Lord, but they lead into the ravines of despair, the desolate summits of pride, and, finally, into the darkness of death. A voice cries in wilderness. "Make straight in the desert a highway for our God!" The high places are brought low by the cry of judgment. The valleys are lifted by the cry of comfort. John's preaching justifies because the Word is not his own, but the Lord's, Whose sandal the Baptist is not worthy to untie. The Lord makes His own path through His flesh given as a ransoming sacrifice for many. Alleluia! Amen.

SCRIPTURE: John 20:24-31 Life in Jesus' Name by Believing

Written words and spoken promises seem a poor substitute for experiencing the living flesh of Christ with sight and touch. Thomas wouldn't let hearing about Jesus raised from the dead convince or comfort him. "Unless I see in His hands the mark of the nails and place my finger into the mark of the nails, and place my hand into His side, I will never believe." Thomas demands God to satisfy the empirical tribunal of his reason and senses. Is he the judge? Yet, Christ, in mercy, presents Himself for Thomas' examination. He comes not only in body, but in Word. He preaches, "Peace!" and "Do not disbelieve, but believe." As the Lord speaks, so it happens. Thomas' heart is filled with saving faith. Grant me to apprehend You by the Word alone, Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Philippians 4:4-7 The Lord is at Hand!

When the world looks at the church, what should it see? A people full of worries and sorrow? No. St. Paul says. They should see our "reasonableness." Reasonably, if Christ has died and been raised, if we are justified, then what room is there for dreadful mutterings of despair? What room do we have for anger and bitterness? None. The Lord is at hand! He is among us through His promise. He is among us in body and blood that we eat and drink for the forgiveness of sins and the strengthening of faith. Anxiety? Be gone! With thanksgiving, we pray to God. What room is there for doubt? The peace of God, made known in the atoning death and resurrection of God's Son, is ours. Rejoice always, dear saints. Grant me believing joy, O Lord. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Isaiah 40:1-8 Comfort, Comfort, Ye My People

Every calamity testifies to the Lord's judgment. Rather than thinking that we live in an indifferent universe, learn to see God's hand at work everywhere, from plagues to the falling of rulers. Tumults remind us to fear God, to remember His Law, and to sorrow over sins. This is how God reveals Himself in the world through the law, but the Lord does not want to be known this way. He says to His preachers, "Comfort, comfort my people." Why? Her warfare, her unholy rebellion, is ended. God's Son suffered sin's full penalty. For His sake, our iniquity is pardoned. Instead of wrath, we receive double for all our sin. Our sins are washed away, and we gain Christ's own righteousness to be called children of God. Never let me lose the comfort of faith. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Luke 2:1-14 Sermons from Heaven

Folks often read the Bible like a textbook, as if it is only a repository of information. Undeniably, the Bible is full of true history, like Caesar taxing his empire, or the world's creation in six days. And it certainly contains the true religious convictions of men and women who were part of that history, like Mary and Joseph traveling to Bethlehem knowing the child was from God. Most importantly, the Bible conveys sermons from heaven, preaching from God's majes tic throne. Attend the angels' sermon of peace to the shepherds. God's glory fills the skies to fill human hearts with joyful faith in a Savior, Christ the Lord. God opens heaven to preach peace to the men whom He favors for Christ's sake.

Grant me faith in Your sermons from heaven, O Lord. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: John 1:1-14 The Word Became Flesh

The eternal God has spoken. His Word, unlike our own, does not imperfectly represent His inmost thoughts and purposes. It does not just give a sign and symbol of who He is, God's Word is God Himself! Nothing of the divine majesty is lost between the Begetter of the Word and the Begotten Word. How this is possible is impossible to know. It can only be believed. But as we are still staggered in holy awe from the first mystery, we hear a second mystery no less profound and wonderous. "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us." God and creation have become one in the person of Jesus Christ our Savior. Reason and imagination fail. Faith alone grasps the mystery for our joy, salvation, and peace. All praise to Thee, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 23:34-39 A Holy Birth and a Holy Martyr

Christmas Day's comforting images of the Christ Child gently cradled in Mary's arms are followed by the remembrance of violence that befell St. Stephen, the first of the Christ's holy martyrs. It is fitting. Remember the hymn. "Good Christian, fear; for sinners here the silent Word is pleading. Nails, spear shall pierce Him through, the cross be borne for me, for you." Jesus was born to bear our sins. He came to expiate them through His atoning, divine blood. God has been propitiated through His death. As the world hated Jesus, so it hates those who boldly confess His redemption. But for you who have Christ's second birth through Baptism and faith, death has lost its power. Learn with St. Stephen to pray, Lord Jesus, receive my spirit. Amen.

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
