THEME OF THE WEEK: The Lord Is Yet To Come Again

During the season of Advent we don't just consider the First Coming of Jesus but we also consider the Second Coming. The first coming was promised of old and it was fulfilled when the angel Gabriel visited Mary and she conceived a son. Jesus was born in Bethlehem, lived, died, and rose from the dead. Just as we know the first coming was promised and then fulfilled, our certainty of the Second Coming of Jesus is built upon the promise that He will come again. We know it will happen just as the first coming happened. We abide in this hope.

SUN

SCRIPTURE: Luke 21:25-36 The coming of Christ

Jesus says that we should watch ourselves lest our hearts be weighed down with the cares of this life. There are certainly plenty of cares of life in this season of the year. It is easy to allow them to cause anxiousness and worry. There is a lot to do and not much time to do it and the energy levels are waning. The answer to this is that you "stay awake at all times, praying that you may have the strength." Jesus has come into the world and will come again so that you need not be weighed down. For the burden of Jesus is light and He gives you the strength to endure the cares of this life. *Dear Jesus, lift me up that I may not be weighed down by the cares of this life. Amen.*

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 42 – Proceeding to the House of God

How natural it is to doubt God in times of suffering! The devil, the world, and the sinful flesh are quick to ask, "Where is your God? Either He is angry with you, or He cares nothing for you, or He does not exist at all." Dear Christians, do not listen to them. Instead, like the psalmist, go to the House of God in times of mourning and oppression. For there you will find God's Word, which strengthens you even in times of sorrow to hope in the Lord Jesus Christ, your Salvation and your God. *O God, save us from the oppression of our enemy and command us with Your steadfast love. Amen.*

TUE

SCRIPTURE: Romans 15:4-13—Our Lord Sustains us

Christ came as a servant, the greatest of all servants, both to the Jews and the Gentiles. That is to say, Christ is a servant to all. As we wait for Christ's coming again in glory, the flesh can become weary, wondering if we have the strength to endure to the end. So we have the Word, incarnate and spoken and written down for our edification. It is that Word that encourages us and grants us the endurance to abide in Him until the end. Don't look to your own strength, that will surely fail. Instead, receive from God the forgiveness of sins and the promise of salvation that will allow you to live in harmony with one another and in accord with Christ Jesus; so that we may glorify Him, no matter our ills, until the great day of His coming. *God of hope, fill us with all joy and peace in believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit we may abound in hope. Amen.*

SCRIPTURE: Micah 4:1-7 World Peace

At the United Nations building in New York there is a bronze statue of a man wielding a hammer, beating a sword into a ploughshare. The statue was a gift to the United Nations from the then Soviet Union in 1959. The irony of a Biblical allusion by a militantly atheistic country like the USSR notwithstanding, the meaning is clear – through the diplomacy and intervention of organizations like the UN, there could be a lasting peace brought on the world. A worthy goal no doubt. But the true and lasting peace preached by Micah can only be found in Christ and His forgiveness, in His ingathering of all peoples to Zion the Church, where He will be their God. Work for peace. But there is only one Prince of Peace. *Jesus, be our King. Reign in us. Amen.*

SCRIPTURE: Luke 1:26-35: Name Him Jesus

The angel Gabriel from heaven came to Mary. "Rejoice!" Indeed, this news is not only joy for Mary but for the entire world. "You will conceive in your womb and bring forth a Son, and shall call His name JESUS... That Holy One who is to be born will be called the Son of God." God has a birth. God has a mother. God has a body. And all of this is so that God can have a funeral. Imagine it! The Son of God becomes the Son of Mary so that He can be crucified for us and become our Savior! Mary is not the only one who found favor with God. *O Lord, we thank You that You took on our humanity and our sin to win for us heavenly favor and mercy. Amen.*

SCRIPTURE: Romans 2:1-16: No Excuse

Paul lets no one off the hook. Every human being is a sinner and deserving of God's wrath, even the Gentiles who were never given the Ten Commandments. Their conscience, says Paul, is enough to accuse them. We are not only condemned by God's standard of right and wrong, we are even condemned by our own. Imagine this: you are wearing a recorder around your neck, and every time you judge or condemn another person it clicks on and records what you say. And the Lord uses this recording, your own words, to judge you. I would rather have the Ten Commandments! But, thanks be to God, Jesus has taken all of our sin, and all of the wrath it deserved. He alone is our hope. He is our forgiveness, life, and salvation. *Lord, be merciful to me, a sinner. Amen.*

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 91 – We Walk with Angels All the Way

This is the psalm that the devil misused in his temptation of Jesus, but Satan's abuse does not negate God's good purpose in giving us these words. God wills that we be comforted and encouraged in knowing that He has commanded His heavenly hosts to be our guards and protectors. What honor is given to us Christians, that we walk with angels all the way! Though sin, death, and the devil pursue us, we need not fear. The Most High has commanded His angels concerning us to guard us in all our ways, and finally to our heavenly home. *We praise You, O God, for the protection of Your holy angels. Amen.*
