# Around the Word Devotions + the week of January 31-February 6, 2021

#### THEME OF THE WEEK: The Lord's Call to Repentance

The Lord comes to us, but not in the manner we would expect. He comes not with fairness, but with forgiveness for all. He comes, not to spare us from death, but to die it for us. He comes, not to simply live, but to live a life fulfilling the law. He comes, not to speak for us, but to teach us how to speak His Word. He comes, not to give us a treasure to hide, but to give us a gift to use. He comes, not to encourage us to leave others be, but to proclaim to them the reality of Himself. He comes, not to elicit only our worship, but the worship of the entire creation.

#### SCRIPTURE: Matthew 20:1-16 - The Lord isn't Fair, but He is Generous

It's not fair. That is the basic premise of the complaint of the laborers. They have worked harder, longer, more faithfully. They have been through the heat of the day and the scorching sun. Why shouldn't they get greater rewards? Because the Lord isn't fair. He does not give as we deserve. And thanks be to God for that. The assumption of the Laborers is that their work in the vineyard has earned them their wages, that they don't deserve to be thrown into prison. But the reality is every worker deserves the wages of death, as sin demands. But our Lord, who is generous, Who gives what is His as He so chooses, gives His life for sinners. He pays eternal wages for work He Himself has done. Lord, thank You for giving me what is Yours. Amen.

#### SCRIPTURE: Psalm 23 - Not Abandoned to Death

Perhaps the most frightening thing in this life is when you are forced to confront the darkness of death, when you are forced to look up and see the shadow cast over all creation, and to realize that it comes for all, rich/poor, great/small, that it is no respecter of persons. And in this, there is the temptation to believe that we are alone. But David reminds us that the Lord does not abandon us, even in death. "I will fear no evil, for You are with me." The Lord walks through this valley of death with us, and in fact, ahead of us. His are the steps we follow, into the grave, and back out. The Lord has not abandoned us to death, but has tasted it for us, that it would no longer hold us captive or cause us fear. Lord, thank You for defeating death for me. Amen.

### SCRIPTURE: Luke 2:22-32 - Praying for the End

"Lord, now let thou servant depart in peace." These words are familiar to all who have used the historic liturgy. We sing them after receiving to our mouths Christ's body and blood. And we do so for good reason. Here we join our voices to Simeon's prayer. Having seen the Lord's Christ in the Blessed Sacrament, we pray to depart in peace, according to the Word of the Lord. That is to say, every time we pray these words, we are praying for the end to come, the end of our lives where we will be called to eternal glory with the Lord. And so, every faithful Christian who has departed this life confiding in their Savior, has at that moment received an answer of "yes" to this most ancient prayer. Lord, let me live and die, confessing You. Amen.

### SCRIPTURE: Jeremiah 1:4-10 - Speaking Boldly the Word

There is a great temptation to be afraid that when we speak we are somehow going to mess up the confession of the faith, that we will do such damage to the church because of our own inadequacies, that it would be better for us to not speak than to risk messing it up. However, the Lord, Who has planted His word into our ears, and through that also into our hearts and minds, will also cause that Word to come from our mouth. Even when we don't cite it precisely, the Holy Spirit will still work through His Word to create faith, soften hearts, and bring many into the kingdom. Therefore, we do well neither to fear either the speaking nor those we speak to, but should strive only to be faithful. O Lord, open my lips, and my mouth will declare Your praise. Amen.

### SCRIPTURE: Matthew 25:14-30 - Being Faithful with a Little

The devil would have us take the great treasure of the Lord's Word and hide it in the ground, bury it, so that it is never used in this life. He does this because He knows that the Word, when it is wielded, sharpens Saints, produces good works for our neighbor, creates a devout faith in the Lord, and brings sinners out of the devil's house and into the house of the Lord. So the devil would have us not use it. The Lord, however, encourages us to use His Word in our daily lives, living by it, confessing it to our neighbor, and teaching it to our children. In doing that, the gift the Lord gives to us multiplies greatly, and we, who are faithful, are bid on the last day, like these servants, to "enter into the joy of your master." Lord, help me to use Your Word daily in my life. Amen.

## SCRIPTURE: Acts 17:22-34 - Everyone Has a God

The simple reality of the world is that everyone has a god. The question, then, is who is that god, what is its name? Is it the god of mammon? Is it the god of Athletica? Is it the god of politics? Or perhaps the god of evolution? Regardless, everyone has a god. But only the Christian has the true God who saves. This God, who is unknown to the world, is preached by the Church for the same reason Paul preaches at the Areopagus, that those who worship in darkness would be brought into the light. The Christian God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, is He who created everything, rules everything, and is coming back to judge everything. Most importantly, this is the God who has redeemed everything. Lord, help me to proclaim You to the world. Amen.

### SCRIPTURE: Psalm 114 - The Lord of Creation

The same God who created the sky, the mountains, the sea, the land, and filled them all, that God also has control over His creation. He alone can tell it to move or to be still. And at His presence alone creation leaps for joy, trembles in fear, and worships its creator. Indeed, even the stones may cry out in praise. We ought to learn from this, then, that the Lord, and not the creation, is to be worshiped. We, who have been created in the image of God, are indeed to be caretakers of creation, but not to the extent that it becomes another god. Creation worships the Lord, so we ought to follow its gaze and do the same, but realizing, the Lord came, not as a mountain, but as a man, to redeem man. Lord, bless my right worship of You. Amen.
