THEME OF THE WEEK: Living Orthodoxy: Devotion to the Pure Doctrine of God

"You will know the truth," Jesus says, "and the truth will set you free." Truth is freedom and life, and this is because Jesus is the Truth. False teachers and false teaching are dangerous because the point us away from Jesus, away from His death and resurrection, away from His mercy and gentleness. We hear this warning this week: the call to seek the truth, to abandon falsehood, to be devoted to the pure doctrine of God, and find in this doctrine our joyous freedom.

SUN

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 7:15-23: Beware

"Beware!" Every time that word is used in the New Testament it is talking about one thing: false doctrine. False doctrine, it turns out, is the most dangerous thing in the world. There are a lot of things that can destroy our bodies, but false doctrine and unholy teaching is like cancer to our soul. "Beware," says Jesus, "of false prophets." Look out for them, because they come to devour you with lies. Out life is found in truth, or better, in the Truth. "I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life," says Jesus, and the truth of His death and resurrection give us life and peace. Lord Jesus, protect us from false doctrine, and keep us in the truth of Your Word. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 119:57-64 (HETH): The Cords of the Wicked

"Though the cords of the wicked ensnare me, I do not forget your law" (119:61). Can you imagine it? All the enemies of God have gathered around you, they've tripped you, tied you up hand and foot, and they are dragging you around with their cords and ropes. They abuse and afflict you, and still you pray to the Lord, "I do not forget Your law." No matter the trouble we have in this life, the Lord's comfort delight our soul. *O Lord, I am a companion of all who fear You, of those who keep Your precepts. The earth, O Lord, is full of Your steadfast love; teach me Your statutes! Amen.*

SCRIPTURE: Romans 8:12-17: Children or Heirs

Paul talks about two spirits, the "spirit of slavery" and the "Spirit of adoption of sons." Those are the two options: a slave or a son. The devil wants us enslaved, bound by sin and the fear of death. The Son comes to set us free, and if He sets us free we are free indeed! He sets us free by adopting us into His family. Jesus is our brother! So, in Christ we are free from sin, free from condemnation, free from the fear of death, and we cry out to God as a gracious heavenly Father who delights to hear our prayers. *Heavenly Father, thank You for adopting us as Your children and giving us the Spirit of adoption as sons. Amen.* WED

SCRIPTURE: Jeremiah 15:19-21: Jeremiah will stand before God

It's not easy being a prophet. Jeremiah was sent to stand before rulers and kings and preach the thundering terror of God's judgment. He would suffer for it. Jeremiah was ridiculed, arrested, thrown in a pit, exiled, maybe even stoned to death by his own countrymen. But more frightful than standing before kings was the prospect of standing before God. But look how the Lord comforts Jeremiah. "If you return, I will restore you, and you shall stand before Me" (15:19). Clothed in Christ, we have nothing to fear. We are ready to stand before the Lord in the perfection of the forgiveness of our sins. *O Lord, cover us with the*

righteousness of Your Son so that we would be ready to stand before You in joy and peace. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 7:22-29: Two Houses

Here are two houses. One build on rock, the other built on sand. Before the rain comes they look the same. Maybe the house built on sand looks even nicer. (They saved so much money on the foundation!) But the storm shows the truth: one stands, the other is rubble. Jesus uses this picture to show the difference between the people who hear His preaching and those who do not. The world will pass away, but the Word of the Lord endures forever, and when we are established in His Word we also stand. *Lord, build our house on the immovable foundation of Your Word. Strengthen us to stand through the storm so that we will, at last, stand before You. Amen.*

FRI

SCRIPTURE: Acts 20:17-38: Paul Preaches in Miletus

What a sermon! The pastors in Ephesus travel to Miletus to meet Paul and hear final words from him. The central verse is 20:28, "Pay careful attention to yourselves and to all the flock, in which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to care for the church of God, which He obtained with His own blood." Theologically, this text stuns us as it talks about the "blood of God." God has blood. God has a body. God is born. God dies. The incarnation of Jesus makes the unimaginable possible: the eternal God bleeds for us, and His blood redeems us from sin, from death, and the power of the devil. *O Lord, grant us joy and peace in Your blood and death. Amen.*

SAT

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 126: Back From Captivity

The Babylonians dragged the people of God into exile in 586 BC. For 70 years they sat by the rivers of Babylon and wept as they remembered Zion. The Lord heard their cries and delivered them, and they pray this Psalm as the travel back to the Holy Land. "When the Lord restored the fortunes of Zion, we were like those who dream. Then our mouth was filled with laughter, and our tongue with shouts of joy; then they said among the nations, "The Lord has done great things for them." The Lord has done great things for us; we are glad." When we remember the death of Jesus for us we pray the same Psalm. The Lord also has delivered us. He has brought us out of darkness into His kingdom of light and life. *O Lord. You have rescued us. We are glad! Amen.*

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
