THEME OF THE WEEK: He is Risen to Carry the Prayers of Believers to God

SUN

SCRIPTURE: John 16:23-30 d - Asking In His Name

In truth, prayer is one of the most difficult aspects of the Christian life. Why do many prayers appear to go unanswered? Why pray at all if God knows what we need? But in this text, Jesus cuts through our hesitations and doubts. He tells us that the prayers of believers are heard by the Father directly. All Christians have access to the Father. We don't treat Him as a vending machine to put in our prayer and get what we want, but because He loves us. Prayer does not begin with us. It begins with God. Our gracious Father invites us to come to Him with all our needs, cares, and worries. He has graciously promised to hear us. Through this promise, our faith is strengthened. Almighty God, bless me that my faith may grow as I come before You with all my cares and concerns. Hear me as I pray in the name of Jesus Christ, my Lord. Amen.

MON

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 84 – A Day in His Courts

If prayer begins not with us but with God, this Psalm opens our eyes to see the richness of what prayer offers to us. Prayer is the chance to simply 'be' before God. Lutherans are often uncomfortable with this spiritual kind of thinking, but this is what prayer offers to us. It is a chance for God's people to come before Him and to benefit from His strength. We belong in the presence of our God and He blesses us as we abide in His Word that nourishes us and strengthens us. It is a wonderful practice to read Scripture and then use those words as the basis for meditation and prayer. Almighty God, You are my dwelling place. You are the source of my strength and my shield from trouble. Bless me with peace this day and into tomorrow. Hear me as I pray in the name of Jesus, Amen.

TUE

SCRIPTURE: James 4:1-7 - Need and Want

Were you ever told by your parents that you needed to learn the difference between "need" and "want?" It is a lesson that all people must learn. It is a lesson that even needs to be taught in the Church. On the one hand, some prayers we speak are for things that we do not need but come from our own sense of covetousness or greed. On the other hand, there are things that we need but we don't ask for them. Consider the content of your prayers. What are you asking for? From where does your desire to pray come? May we keep our eyes focused on Christ Who grants us His mercy and Who gives us the one thing truly needful: forgiveness. Almighty God, forgive me for my weakness and selfish sinful nature. Bless me that I may turn only to You in all things. Hear me in the name of Jesus, Amen.

WED

SCRIPTURE: Jeremiah 29:11-14 – Plans for Whom?

This passage contains one of the most abused Old Testament texts. This message of God's promised plan is for the Israelites living in exile. It is a promise for the restoration of Israel, not a promise that you will get a promotion at work or that you will get a good mortgage rate. It is a promise from God that He will restore Israel. Why? Because it is through Israel that the Messiah has come. God has given the fortune of salvation and forgiveness to His people – to all people who trust in Jesus Christ. This text can serve as an important reminder for us to not put ourselves at the center of Scripture, but Jesus Christ is the center. Merciful Lord, I thank You for sending Jesus to be the fulfillment of all Your promises in the Scriptures. Bless me and keep me in Him. Hear me as I pray in the name of Jesus. Amen.

THU

SCRIPTURE: Mark 16:14-20 – He Sat Down at the Right Hand of God

Today we rejoice and remember the Ascension of our Lord. This text reminds us that the ascension isn't the end of Jesus' ministry. He didn't return to the Father and simply put His feet up and wait for the end of the world. No, Jesus continued to work through the ministry of His apostles as they did as He commanded, taking the Gospel out into the world. In the same way, Jesus today continues to work amongst His people through the Word and the Sacraments. Our Lord is ascended, but He is not far removed from us. Nonetheless, we look forward to the day when our prayers to Him can be delivered face to face. *Almighty*

God, thank You for sending Your son to redeem me and give me life. Keep me in this true faith. Hear me as I pray in the name of Jesus, Amen.

FRI

SCRIPTURE: Romans 8:24-28 - Prayer Assistant

This text reminds us of one of the Holy Spirit's greatest gifts to us. He prays for us when we do not know what to pray for or how to pray. Not that this excuses us from prayer or makes our prayers worthless. Rather, it is a great comfort to know that our prayers are bolstered, and our weaknesses and foolish sinfulness do not turn the Father from us because the Holy Spirit helps us in our prayers. Truly God does not leave us alone to figure things out for ourselves even when it comes to prayer. Almighty and merciful God, thank You for giving me the Holy Spirit Who assists me and intercedes for me before You. Grant that my prayers may not be found wanting in Your sight. Hear me as I pray in the name of Jesus, Amen.

SAT

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 124 – If God is For Us

How does a life of prayer benefit us? This whole week we have looked at prayer and been reminded of the many ways that God works through prayer. But what simple benefit does it give? It gives us the certainty that God is for us. We don't need to cast out our desires into the universe in the vain hope that it might be heard. We don't have to do certain things to earn God's attention or favor. Rather, God's attention and favor is upon us because we have the blessing of the Son. We have Jesus Who promises that not only does He hear our prayer, but that the Father hears us for the sake of the Son. Thanks be to God for this certainty and comfort that God grants to His people! Almighty God, I know that You are for me because You sent Your only Son to win my salvation. Grant me this eternal and lasting comfort that is only found in You. Hear me as I pray in the name of Jesus, Amen.
