THEME OF THE WEEK: He is Risen to Proclaim the Truth

SCRIPTURE: John 16:5-15 Working with Words

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 82 Our Power is Jesus

In Exodus 22:8 Moses identifies that the judges in Israel are also called "gods". These are the same people the Psalmist talks about in Psalm 12:4, 10:3, 4:6, who are all defiant and will endure no master because they believe they are "gods" and "lords". Here we learn about the lurking specter power and prestige. No matter if you are poor or wealthy, great or small, child or adult, when you taste power and prestige they will make you drunk with idolatry. Against this the Psalmist asks God to arise and strike the earth with the judgment of His Word of Truth. Dear God, keep me from fruitless love of power and help me keep firm grasp on Christ. In Him I am strong. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: James 1:16-21 God is a Good Gift Giver

God is a good gift giver. This is the first basis for the Christian faith. "I believe in God, the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth." God is a good gift giver. Trusting in God as a good gift giver keeps us from fruitless pursuits of worldly passion. James tells us that we must be slow to speak, quick to hear, and slow to anger because anger does not produce God's righteousness. Put your trust in God and receive His good gifts with humility and the Holy Spirit will guard your heart and soul. Turn your nose up at God and He will let you fall in your pride. Holy Father, keep me rooted firmly in the true faith throughout my days and with humility let me received Your Good Gifts well. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Isaiah 12:1-6 Jesus is Our Song

There are many days and times when we believe God isn't a good gift giver. We believe we can and will do better. However, in Christ, those days are dusk. The Prophet gives words to us Christians for our days in Christ. In these days of Jesus, God's anger has turned and He gives us comfort. God has given us His Salvation in the concrete. In Christ we draw deeply from the well of Salvation. In Christ we sing eternal praises. Christ the Holy One of Israel is in our midst and He is great. *Dear Father, help me to rest in Christ and all Your good gifts and works for me. Amen.*

SCRIPTURE: John 8:21-36 Do not Be Confused

Confusion is the mark of bad theologians. Jesus isn't confused. He is clear. He is truthful. The people surrounding him are confused. They do not understand. They will not understand. They are putting their trust in their heritage, in the ancestry, in their traditions. Those things will not save. Abraham will not save them. Sinners in the Church are constantly tempted to place their trust in their traditions, heritages, family names, and the like. "We've been coming here for 70 years!" Repent. This will not save you. Heavenly Father, let my trust and hope always be in Your Son and not traditions and family names. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: 2 Corinthians 5:14-21 Selfishness Stinks

St. Paul makes it clear. He is neither goal oriented nor programmatic toward the Church. The Church and Paul's ministry are constrained by Christ. They are driven toward Christ. Christ died to deliver His people from their fatal bondage to themselves. The lingering stink of selfishness is undone by the constant reception of the good gifts of God. "We proclaim Christ's death until He comes" in the Lord's Supper. We remember and receive the good news that Christ died for us, and He was raised for our justification. That is, in Christ's Resurrection our trust in Him is publicly revealed as right. *Dear Jesus, help me rest in You and Your work. Amen.*

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 126 Patience

This Psalm teaches us to wait patiently for the Lord. The basis for this wait is the remembrance that God has done great things for the people of Israel (vs. 3). These things are the predicate for their hope. We, too, have seen and received good things from our God. In Jesus, God the Father makes us glad. Jesus is far greater than anything Abraham or Moses had. They longed for the day of their Redeemer's salvation. They longed for the church's glorious age in which you live. We have the outcome of their hope, Jesus. He is enough. *Dear Father, teach me contentment in Christ so that I might love what You have given me and be glad. Amen.*
