THEME OF THE WEEK: The Second Coming of Christ

This is the time of the Christian year where we turn our hearts and minds toward the last things; the coming of Christ to judge the quick and the dead and the finality of that judgment, the temporal nature of the things of this world, and the glory of the life to come. The Christian man, full of wisdom, anticipates these things and orders his life by them, for they are the end and goal of our Christian hope. SUN

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 25:1-13 The Wise and Foolish Virgins

The thing that separates the wise from the foolish is not what they look like or what they do. They are all virgins. They are all decked in the same baptismal wedding garment. Likewise, they all fail morally - they all fall asleep in their wait for the Bridegroom when he is seemingly delayed. What separates them is faith. The wise trust in the Lord who justifies the ungodly, they have oil. But the foolish had their oil, their trust, consumed by other goods and other gods. To the wise he bids them come to the wedding, but those who do not trust him he says "I do not know you." Trust in the Lord. For you know not the hour of His return.

Lord preserve our faith until the end, that we would come to Your feast with joy when You come. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 103 Who Remembers You?

"As for man, his days are like grass; as a flower of the field, so he flourishes. For the wind passes over it, and it is gone, and its place remembers it no more." (Ps. 103:15-16 NKJV). "Its place" is shorthand for man's domain – his family, his community, his world, really everything that we would think would remember us when we are gone. But it doesn't. We want to be remembered, and we might be for a while, but eventually memories fade, even as last year's grass. "But the mercy of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting" (vs. 17). SCRIPTURE: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11 The Day of the Lord

The unbelieving world, marked in this passage by spiritual darkness, sleepiness, and drunkenness will continue to think that the world will keep going as it has been. "Peace and safety!" they cry, when there is no peace apart from faith and no safety apart from Jesus. They are heading for destruction as the great day of the Lord comes upon them unawares. But the Christians, those who eagerly await the Lord's coming, continue to encourage one another and build each other up in faith. They put on the sober virtues of faith, hope, and love so as to meet their Lord who died for them, whether they wake or sleep. There they have peace, safety. Lord Jesus, help us to put off the works of darkness and so meet You with joy when You come again. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Isaiah 65:17-19 New Heavens and New Earth

This world is passing away. As far as creation is concerned, there is no renewal, no salvaging of the old world. Indeed, the world is stored up for the conflagration of fire "But the heavens and the earth which are now preserved by the same Word, are reserved for fire until the day of judgment and perdition of ungodly men" (2 Pt. 3:7). Indeed, the only things which will come out of this present world are the souls who trust in the Lord Jesus. What are you storing up for? The things which you strive after already have a burning fuse attached to it. Put your trust in eternal things, the eternal gospel which has been proclaimed to you, so that you will come to that new heaven and new earth which does not fade away. Lord keep us steadfast in Your Word. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Luke 12:13-21 The Rich Foo

It's weird that the rich man addresses his soul. Who talks to their soul? You would think that he would address his body, that element of him which gets to enjoy all that food and drink and leisure. Now there is nothing wrong with food and drink and leisure, or even with making profit, but if these things are the sum total of your life so that you will say to your SOUL, that is, your entire spiritual being, that all is well with you, that you need not think of repentance from sin and faith toward Christ, you are literally, according to this parable, a damned fool. Lay up treasure therefore in heaven, not on earth. And do that by saying to your soul, "Soul, you need Jesus." Lord, make me rich toward You and not toward anything else in this world. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Revelation 21:1-7 "The Former Things...

....have passed away." (vs. 4) What former things are we talking about? Pain. Sickness. Death. Sorrow. Weeping. These are the things that have no place in the New Jerusalem, the new City of actual, lasting, peace. These former things have lost all their power in Jesus' death and resurrection. And yet they are borne to a lesser extent in those who are His Baptized. That is your experience here. You know sorrow and tears and death. But they are the former things. They are coming to an end. New things are indeed come – "Behold, I make all things new!" (vs. 5). This new thing begun in your baptism will be brought to completion in the day of utter and complete peace, joy, and happiness. Lord, sustain me and bring me to Your new things. Amen.

SAT

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 27 Wait.

David, speaking in the Holy Spirit, encourages the soul to "wait on the Lord, be of good courage, and He shall strengthen your heart; Wait, I say, on the Lord!" (vs. 14 NKJV). He is doubly emphatic — wait! He says this specifically because of our tendency to NOT wait and trust that the Lord will deliver on His promises. He says "He WILL strengthen your heart" which means that right now, his heart needs strengthening. This psalm is not pious self-talk or bravado "My heart will not fear..." but is godly encouragement to those who suffer the effects of sin in this life. It points us not to ourselves but to the Lord who is mighty to save. For those who pray thus in faith, the Lord WILL strengthen him by His Spirit. Lord, strengthen me by Your Word. Amen.

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
