Around the Word Devotions + the week of November 29-December 5, 2020

THEME OF THE WEEK: The Lord Comes Even Now

This week as we enter into the Advent season yet again, we will focus on how our King comes. We will see that He comes to call us, He comes to clothe us, and He comes to grant us deliverance. One of the great mercies our King gives is to hold His Church together as His own. This is especially important in these days as so many are separated from the larger body of believers and are unable to gather for worship. Know that Jesus is still our King and our Lord. SUN

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 21:1-9 The King's Coming Brings Rejoicing

It might seem strange to begin the season of Advent with an event that happened only days before the death of our Lord. This is necessary for two reasons. First, we are reminded of the joy that Christ's coming brings. We look forward to the day when our Lord will return and we will rejoice at His coming much like the crowd in Jerusalem. But it is also good because it rightly orients us as we prepare to celebrate Christmas. The joy of Christmas is not simply the miracle of life in a new baby. The joy comes from knowing that our Lord became flesh so that He would one day die for our redemption. His coming brings rejoicing

though for Him it meant death. Righteous Lord, please grant to me in these days a proper joy for all that You have accomplished for me. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 4:18-22 The King Comes to Call

It is easy for us to imagine how we might react if put in the same situation as figures from the Bible. How would we react to the call of Jesus to follow Him? But this is no hypothetical situation. All who are baptized have been called by Jesus to follow Him. You follow the Lord each day of your life. His call for you to follow never needs to be renewed or made again, because He even yet today desires for you to follow Him. People follow those who are worth following. Our Lord Jesus is certainly worthy of us following Him and going where He goes. May we have the courage to do so. Almighty God, grant me the courage and strength to follow my Lord Jesus where He leads. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Romans 13:11-14 The King Comes to Clothe Us

One of the first things that we do every morning is get dressed. At this time of year, perhaps you enjoy putting on a sweater or a favorite warm item of clothing. We have clothes for work, clothes for chores, clothes for relaxing, and many other things that we wear. In our text today, St. Paul encourages us to put on the clothes that our King has given us. We put on Jesus, we put on His righteousness and His goodness. This is no mere article of clothing, but it is the armor of light. By it, we are protected from the evil of the devil and the world. We live as people who are clothed in light rather than the filthy rags of darkness. We do this because our Lord has dressed us. O Lord, help me to live as someone who You have clothed in the light of Christ. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Jeremiah 33:14-18 The King Comes to Garden

This text shows us the unbelievable love of God for His people. Even in the midst of decrees about the destruction that will come upon the land due to the sinfulness of the people, God still makes promises to faithfully maintain the righteous branch. He promises His people will benefit from His faithfulness to the old promises of redemption through Abraham's Seed. He had not forgotten because of the people's sin. The promise of the Messiah would be kept. The people from whom the Messiah would come would be protected, not because they were more righteous than others, but because God had chosen them. Through Christ, the Father has chosen you as well. We are made a part of God's faithful people not through birth, but through baptism. Almighty God, preserve me that I may always receive the blessings You give. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Luke 1:1-25 The King Sends His Messenger

John, who was the last of the Old Testament era prophets had a miraculous birth from aged parents. Through his ministry, the Word was fulfilled that Elijah would be a forerunner of the Messiah. Truly, a child is a great blessing, and it is a gift that our God sometimes chooses not to give. This can be a painful reality for many. Despite this, we find comfort knowing that there is no reproach from the Lord for not having children. Rather, our value and place before God comes not through our works or the fruitfulness of our bodies, but it is found in our receiving God's gifts of grace, lavished upon us for Christ's sake, by faith. O

Lord, in Your wisdom, You choose to close the womb. Be with those who bear this cross and grant them Your comfort. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Colossians 1:12-23 The King Comes to Keep Us Together

One of the most significant images that we find for the Church in the New Testament is incorporation into the body of Christ. A healthy body is united and functions properly. How wonderful that we have been incorporated into Christ's perfect body by baptism and faith. By faith we're conformed to His sufferings and death, it's true, but also to His resurrection and eternal life. His redeeming humanity is now the pattern of our own redeemed humanity. Our King gives us His Holy Spirit through His strong and unchanging Word. By the means of Word and sacrament He holds all of us together as His Church, not desiring to see one of us wander astray. Lord Jesus Christ, You are the head of the Church and are my head as well. Help me to be conformed to Your will that I may serve You in righteousness and truth. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 143 The King Comes to Deliver

This week, we have seen all the ways our Lord works for our help and salvation. He has given us His blessings by calling us to Himself, by clothing us, and holding us together. We answer His call to follow with great joy. We do this because, as we see in this Psalm today, our Lord hears our prayers and our cries for mercy.
