THEME OF THE WEEK: Singlehearted Love of God in Christ

From Norman Vincent Peale to Joel Osteen, a host of celebrity pastors have preached a positive message, apparently assuming that the Word of God is too negative for itching ears. But whoever controls the categories controls the argument. Positive and negative are not paradigms for Lutheran preaching. Rather, the God-given categories are Law and Gospel. Sunday's Gospel Lesson (Mt 22:34-46) is a "Q & A" on the greatest commandment (Law) and Jesus' identity (Gospel), with Jesus giving the answers. The subsequent readings present the full condemnation of the Law and the full consolation of the Gospel for the children of God.

SUN

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 22:34-46 A Question of the Law and of the Gospel

A Rabbi was once asked to summarize the Law while standing on one foot: "Love God. Love your neighbor. Everything else is just commentary." How true! On these two commands hang the Law and the Prophets, which bring you to repentance. But Jesus replied with a question of the Gospel: How could Jesus be David's Son (fully man) and David's Lord (fully God) according to Psalm 110? This question silenced His opponents and helped to shape the Christian creeds. So love God and your neighbor, O Christian. But greater than your love is the One who loves perfectly, David's Son and David's Lord. On Him hangs your sin. On Him hangs your life and salvation. *Hail! Hosanna, David's Son! Jesus, hear our supplication! (LSB 350.4). Amen.*

MON

SCRIPTURE: Introduction to Psalm 119:137-144 The Righteousness of God in Christ

Each eight-verse strophe (think of hymn stanzas) of this acrostic Psalm begins with a letter of the twenty-two vocables of the Hebrew alphabet, an acrostic "Portals of Prayer." This strophe begins with the first letter of the word "righteousness." A few key words preach the Law to show you your need for His righteousness: you are *small, despised*, and full of *trouble* and *anguish* in this life. Repent! But the word "righteousness" appears in various forms six times. God alone is righteous in Christ, whose promises are true. His Word gives you faith in His righteousness, which is yours now and evermore. *Thy strong Word bespeaks us righteous: Bright with Thine own holiness, Glorious now, we press toward glory, And our lives our hopes confess (LSB 578.3). Amen.*

TUE

SCRIPTURE: 1 Corinthians 1:4-9 St. Paul's Thanksgiving for the Saints in Corinth

See how the singlehearted love of God in Christ embraces the church's past, present, and future! All of the gifts mentioned in this reading were first given to you in Holy Baptism: God's grace, the entire Christ, and every gift of the Holy Spirit. The gifts of God in Christ are yours here and now, for all who live by baptismal grace "are not lacking in any gift" (v. 7). And St. Paul is an especially forward-looking or end-times writer, promising the church of all ages that Christ will sustain His people to the end, guiltless at His second coming. Thus it is fitting for you to make the sign of the cross at the words "and the life of the world to come" and to pray with the hymn writer, *Teach us to bear Your blessed cross, To find in You all pleasure (LSB 647.4). Amen.*

WED

SCRIPTURE: Deuteronomy 10:12-21 The SINGLEHEARTED Love of God in Christ

One cannot overestimate the significance of Deuteronomy as Moses, from the plains of Moab, preached the longest sermon in the Bible (maybe the longest ever?) on God's singlehearted love for you. After a forty-year training, Israel is addressed as God's own heart, about to enter the promised land and prepare for the Messiah's coming. His 'last will and testament' still rings in your ears to bring you to repentance. Then Joshua (Yeshua = Jesus) led Israel into the promised land, foreshadowing One greater than Moses, the new Jordan of Holy Baptism, and your life in the New Israel of all believers. *Come, Thou long-expected Jesus, Born to set Thy people free: From our fears and sins release us; Let us find our rest in Thee (LSB 338.1). Amen.*

THU

SCRIPTURE: John 15:1-17 The Singlehearted Love of God IN CHRIST

This saying is trustworthy and true: "The Gospel presumed is the Gospel denied." See how modern American Evangelicalism presumes that everyone is justified but no one is sanctified, resulting in preaching more Law than Gospel! Jesus clarifies the relationship between faith and works with a simple and vivid metaphor. He is the true vine, the source of all that you are and all that you have. You are His branches, drawing your life not from motivational speeches or end-times panic, but rather from Christ's holy word and sacraments. Thus does Christ sanctify and keep you, O Christian, in the one true faith. *Give us faith to trust You boldly, Hope, to stay our souls on You; But, oh, best of all Your graces, With Your love our love renew (LSB 851.4). Amen.*

FRI

SCRIPTURE: 1 John 3:1-8 The Singlehearted LOVE OF GOD in Christ

Yesterday's lesson clarified the relationship between faith and works by speaking of vine and branches. Today's reading, also from St. John the Apostle, uses an equally straight-forward metaphor: little children. God the Father loved you so much that He made you His own baptismal child. Indeed, John's frequent use of "little children" reflects the self-giving love of the Trinity that flows from the Father, through the Son, by the Spirit. Under the Law, then, those who persist in unrepented sin are of the devil. But in Christ, the perfect Son, your sonship is eternal, for He will not let you, His own child, out of His nail-pierced hands. *Lord, grant that I in ev'ry place / May glorify Thy lavish grace / And help and serve my neighbor (LSB 708.2). Amen.*

SAT

SCRIPTURE: Introduction to Psalm 54 "Deliver Us from Evil"

One church father describes this Psalm as "The voice of Christ to the Father, or of any faithful one, entreating God's help against sins." Here Christ prays for deliverance from His enemies, who falsely accused Him and delivered the innocent One to the death of an insurrectionist. David prayed this Psalm for deliverance when he hid from Saul among the Ziphites (1 Sam 23). And you pray this Psalm in every hour of need, knowing that God will help you and uphold your life (v. 4). God's help might be delayed, but as he did for Jesus, He will vindicate you in the final resurrection of all flesh. Let no false doctrine me beguile; *Let Satan not my heart defile. Give strength and patience unto me / To bear my cross and follow Thee (LSB 708.2). Amen.*

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
