THEME OF THE WEEK: God Manifested in the Transfiguration of Jesus

"Listen to Him." God the Father commands us to listen to His Son, our Lord Jesus Christ. In Jesus all the wisdom of God is manifest. In Jesus all the glory of God shines forth. In Jesus the life of God is found and the grace of God is given. This week we rejoice in Christ, the light of the world, the light of man, and the only hope for poor sinners.

SUN

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 17:1-9, The Hidden Glory

To see Jesus in His transfigured glory! The apostles fell on their faces in fear. Imagine, instead of on the mountain with three disciples, if Jesus would've transfigured on Good Friday. The soldiers drop their hammer and nails; the High Priest hands over his headdress; Pilate gives Jesus his throne; all the people fall on their faces in fear and wonder. This is what really surprises me: the hidden glory of Jesus. He did not stop His suffering and crucifixion and death with the radiance of divine glory. He hid that glory for us. The transfigured Lord is the crucified Christ, the One who freely chooses to suffer to free us from eternal suffering. O Lord Jesus Christ, grant that the glory of Your transfigura-

tion would illuminate Your grace toward us. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 87: A Hymn of Praise to the City of God

It is strange to sing praise to a city, but this is God's city, the heavenly Jerusalem. "Glorious things are spoken of you, O city of God." This city of God is His kingdom, His people, the church, and glorious things are indeed spoken of us. We are the redeemed of the Lord. We are those ransomed from sin, rescued from death, delivered for the demonic kingdom of darkness, and transferred to the glories of the city of God. The Most High Himself has established this city, made us citizens by our baptism, registered us in the Lambs Book of Life, and keeps us safe and still in this eternal city of life and peace. O Lord, we praise You for establishing Your city. Your Church, and enrolling us as citizens. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: 2 Peter 1:16-21: The Prophetic Word Made Sure

St. Peter is remembering the Transfiguration, Moses and Elijah and the cloud of glory and the heavenly voice of God the Father. "We were eyewitnesses of His glory... when we were with Him on the holy mountain." What was Peter's take-away? We expect Peter to speak of the glory of Jesus, or His divine authority. Instead, Peter talks about the Old Testament. "So we have the prophetic word made more sure." When Jesus stands with Moses and Elijah He gives His stamp of approval to the Old Testament prophets. Their preaching is right and good. Their promises: they are all fulfilled in Christ. The hopes and fears of all the years are met in Christ, the beloved Son of the Father. Lord Jesus, let the light of Your Word shine in our hearts. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Isaiah 61:10, 11, Hidden in the LORD's Beauty

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 19:27-30, No Home but an Eternal Throne

I'm surprised that Jesus doesn't chastise Peter for boasting, and warn about pride. Jesus does say, "many who are first will be last, and the last first." But Peter's pride at leaving everything to follow Jesus is met with a reassurance from the Lord. "You will sit on thrones... You will judge the angels... You will inherit eternal life." Truly our suffering in this life is not worthy to be compared to the glory that waits in the life to come. All tears will we wiped away, all shame covered in light, all loss returned a hundredfold. Jesus collects all that the world casts out. He will gather us up in the new world when we awaken to see His face. Heavenly Father, help me to stand in the hope of Your making

SCRIPTURE: 2 Corinthians 4:5, 6, "Let there be light!"

The same voice that spoke into the cosmic darkness and light lept into existence is the voice that has spoken into the darkness of our sinful hearts. The light that shines in our dark hearts is the radiance of the face of Jesus. His smile enlightens our hearts. His glory illuminates our minds, cleanses our consciences, establishes our hope. His image restores us to a life that never ends. How wonderful that the Creator is also our Redeemer, and our Comforter and Friend. He speaks, and we are alive with the knowledge of Christ, the forgiver of sins. O Lord, continue to shine in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ, Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 8: What is Man?

What is man? Weak and dying. Rebellious and sinful. A fury of cursing and sacrilege. We are unholy, unclean, and unworthy of the Lord's care. But He cares. He cares with flesh and blood. God becomes a man. Humble, He is made a little lower than the angels, lower even into our suffering, lower into our sin and shame, lower into our death.
