Around the Word Devotions + the week of December 3-8, 2017

THEME OF THE WEEK: The Lord Comes Even Now

The opening week of Advent is full of expectation, as we look not to the King who came as the babe of Bethlehem, but look forward to the King who comes in right-eousness and justice. He brings us out of the devil's kingdom and plants us in His, through the power of His Word and Holy Sacraments, in order that we would be defended from and delivered from sin, death, and the power of the devil. Although we have no righteousness on our own, He Himself is our righteousness, and has taken away the reproach of our sins.

SUN

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 21:1-9 Behold, Your King

It may strike you odd to read about Holy Week on the first Sunday of Advent, but this reminds us exactly what it is we are preparing for. We are not simply looking to reenact the birth of Jesus; that has already happened! He came once to redeem us from sin and death—we are reminded of that here. But we also confess that Christ will come again to bring us at last into His eternal kingdom on the Last Day. Advent, and this Sunday in particular, direct us toward the end of all things, when our Righteous King will bring us our salvation. O kindle, Lord most holy, Your lamp within my breast to do in spirit lowly all that may please You best. Amen. (LSB 334, stanza 1)

MON

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 1 Blessed is the Man

Two men are presented in the psalm. One blows around in every wind of new doctrine, but the other is firmly grounded in the Lord's Word. One is blessed, but the other is condemned. One will stand in the judgment, the other will perish. But when we look at our lives in the light of the commandments, we see that our delight is not wholly in the Law of the Lord. Thanks be to God for the One Man, Jesus Christ, who delighted in the Law on our behalf and gave us His righteousness, that we might be called blessed by our Father in heaven. O Lord, grant that Your Word would make us fruitful, having been showered by the waters of Your grace. Amen.

TUE

SCRIPTURE: Romans 13:11-14 Salvation is Near

Advent reminds us of the nearness of the Lord's return in judgment. The Apostle reminds us to check the sinful flesh by putting on the Lord Jesus Christ. As Christians, who have put on Christ in baptism, we are locked in a daily struggle against the sinful desires of the flesh. Our Lord would have us look to him for all that we need, rather than taking for ourselves what we desire. Our salvation is at hand, however, and the Lord has already conquered our sins and evil desires by His death. We are no longer enslaved to sin, for we are set free by His blood. O Lord, equip us with the full armor of God that we might stand firm in the evil day. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Jeremiah 33:14-18 Our Righteous Prophet, Priest, and King

Jeremiah teaches us here about the threefold office of Christ. Jesus is our High Priest, who offered Himself as a sacrifice for our sins. St. Paul will later write, "He who knew no sin became sin for us, that in Him we might become the righteousness of God." Jesus is our righteous King, who sits on the throne of David forever to bring justice, salvation, and security to His people. Finally, Jesus is our Prophet, who is prefigured in Jeremiah's office. He brings God's Word of life to us in these last days. O Lord Jesus, fulfill the promises made to our Fathers in the faith, that our righteousness would be found in You. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Luke 1:1-25 The Reproach is Taken Away

Luke opens his gospel with a bridge to the Old Testament: Zechariah and Elizabeth are people of the Old Testament, looking forward to the coming Messiah. Zechariah served as priest, and his wife was even from the daughters of Aaron, the first High Priest. To them, God granted a child, John, who would be the forerunner of the Messiah. Elizabeth rejoiced that the reproach she had borne likely due to her inability to have children would now be removed in a most wondrous way. In the same way, John would point us to the one who would even take away our reproach by pointing us to the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world. O Lord, grant us faith to believe Your promises, that we might not bear the guilt of our sins. Amen.

FRI

SCRIPTURE: Colossians 1:12-23 Transferred to the Kingdom of Christ

Our inheritance in God's Kingdom is not something that we can earn. The Father qualifies us for this through the blood of Christ. Before our redemption, we were under the domain of the devil and sin. But by our Baptism into Christ, we have been transferred into another kingdom. We, who once were opposed to God and far away, have now been brought near by the blood of Christ, who is the head of the Church. We are now at peace with God because in Christ, all things are reconciled back to Him. So that we may obtain this peace, God established the pastoral office through the Apostolic office. O Lord, grant us faithful pastors to bring us the reconciling word of the Gospel, that we might be brought nearer to You. Amen.

SAT

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 143 My Soul Thirsts for You

As sinners, our only plea to God is for mercy. Apart from that, we are doomed to die, for no one is righteous before Him. But God has shown us mercy instead of judgment. He has promised salvation to all who call upon the Name of the Lord. This is made possible by the pleading for mercy Christ did for us in His death, as He spread out His hands on the cross. Bleeding and thirsty, Jesus, the Righteousness of God incarnate, bore the judgment of God for our sins in order to bring us up out of the pit. O Lord, as we prepare to enter Your house tomorrow, bring to our remembrance all that You have done for us in Christ Jesus, our Lord. Amen.
