Around the Word Devotions + the week of July 16-22, 2017

THEME OF THE WEEK: The Sanctification Wrought by the Spirit

Baptized into His Name most Holy we are made children of God and receive God's Holy Spirit. Our journey as disciples of Christ Jesus, initiated by water and the Word, continues our whole life through. The Holy Spirit shapes us and forms us as we encounter our Lord in the Word and are taught, in turn, all that He commanded His disciples. As Scripture lights our path, we are led by the Holy Spirit, on the Way that leads unto life everlasting. We thank God for His continual guidance, for without it we would be entirely lost. We pray that He would continue to preserve and perfect us as we encounter Him in the Word, by the power of His Spirit.

SCRIPTURE: Luke 5:1-11 "At Your word I will let down the nets."

Simon Peter was a skilled fisherman. It's what he did for a living. After a fruitless night of fishing, Jesus offers the seasoned fisherman a word of advice, "Put out into the deep and let down your nets." We know what Peter was likely thinking: "Jesus, this is my realm. I know what I'm doing, but because I respect you I'll give it a try." We think the same way. We go about our necessary business believing that the weight of our well-being rests entirely on our shoulders. What does God have to do with my day to day matters? The haul of fish was extraordinary! Our God is near. He shapes and forms us and makes us His own

through even the ordinary tasks of life. *Lord, forgive me when I fail to recognize Your work in my life that I may live in service to You. Amen.*

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 119:33-40 "Teach me, O Lord . . . Give me understanding."

"Turn my eyes from looking at worthless things; and give me life in Your ways." We are tempted and drawn to worthless things. We ceaselessly look to be entertained by a screen of some sort. Our eyes are flooded with information from countless sources. What's a disciple to do? Look to the Lord. Pray along with the psalmist, "Teach me, O Lord, give me understanding, lead me, incline my heart, turn my eyes, and confirm to Your servant Your promise that You may be feared." Focus on the promise of God; salvation through Christ crucified. His way is life. Through His righteousness we receive eternal life. Lord, preserve me from the distractions of the world and my selfish desire and perfect me in Your way which leads unto life everlasting. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: 1 Peter 3:8-15 "Do not repay evil for evil."

At the conclusion of a court trial for a heinous crime, following the sentence, the judge often allows those who were transgressed the opportunity to address the perpetrator. From time to time, there are powerful words of forgiveness delivered in these tense addresses. Many often wonder how someone can be so forgiving. SCRIPTURE: Jeremiah 16:14-21 "To You shall the nations come."

Our works have earned us death. Yet, our God is a God of mercy and restoration. He opens our eyes that we might see and recognize our idolatry and wandering ways. SCRIPTURE: Matthew 16:13-26 "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?"

Peter got it right. "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." These words did not come naturally to Peter. They were given by the Father who is in heaven. Peter, soon after, falls back into the "things of man" and is rebuked for attempting to stand between Christ and the cross. SCRIPTURE: 1 Peter 2:4-10 "So the honor is for you who believe."

"You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for His own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of Him who called you out of darkness and into His marvelous light . . . once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy." Wow! Do these amazing words of identity apply to me? Am I a part of this "holy nation?" Indeed you are! According to the great mercy of God the Father, He has caused us to be born again—that is baptized, born from above of water and the Spirit—to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ (1 Peter 1:3). Merciful Father, may Your Holy Spirit open my lips that others may know Your excellencies and enter into Your marvelous light through Your Son, Jesus Christ, Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Luke 7:36-50 "Your faith has saved you; go in peace."

Today we remember St. Mary Magdalene, who, according to our Lord, had many sins. She was acutely aware of her sin and her great need for a Savior. Finding herself at the feet of Jesus, she washed His feet with tears of contrition and repentance. Her faith in the mercy of Christ Jesus set her free: "Your sins are forgiven." Her love was great because she was shown great mercy. Her faith impacted her life as she continued to follow Jesus. Today "we sing Your praise for Mary, who came at Easter dawn to look for Jesus' body and found her Lord was gone. But, as with joy she saw Him in resurrection light, may we by faith behold Him, the Day who ends our night!" (LSB 855 v.11)
