SAY THE APOSTLES' CREED

Around the Word Devotions + the week of May 26-June 1, 2019

THEME OF THE WEEK: He is Risen to Carry the Prayers of Believers to God

Rogate is the Sunday of prayer. Prayer marked the disciples' days before the ascension and especially after, awaiting the Holy Spirit's miraculous advent on Pentecost. It marks our entire existence as we stand between Christ's first and second coming. It is the exercise of faith. Our conviction—that Jesus lives, that He has destroyed our sin and death, that He has reconciled us to a gracious Father—this is the source of our prayers. The very same Jesus has told us to pray and promised that we will be heard. In His Name, then, through the Spirit's intercession, we will call to our Father.

SUN

SCRIPTURE: John 16:23-30—In Jesus' Name

There will be a day when we no longer ask for anything. Until that day, we ask for everything. We pray. The promise Jesus gives is that the Father listens. The Father loves us because we have loved and believed in Christ His Son, who came into this world at His incarnation and has gone to Him as the atoning sacrifice for our sins. It is through Jesus, then, that we ask confidently, that is, pray to the Father. The Name of Jesus is the Name of salvation and life. It is the Name of confidence, for by this Name we are saved. Father, hear me for the sake of Jesus, Your Son, my Lord. Amen.



SCRIPTURE: Psalm 84—The Way to God

Have the way to Zion in your heart. The Psalmist means to know and remember fondly the walk up to the Temple in Jerusalem, the house of God, where the Lord meets graciously with His people. When we ask God to give ear to our prayer, we say just what David did: "Behold our shield, O God; look on the face of your Anointed." The anointed one is the Christ, Jesus our Savior. His righteousness grants us access to God. Whenever we pray to God, we ask it in Christ's Name, and thus know we are heard.

Look upon Christ, Lord, for He has redeemed us, and in Him we trust. Amen.

TUE

SCRIPTURE: James 1:22-27—Prayers and Conviction

We are not saved for our prayers. Some Christians boast that they pray every day. That is certainly great. But the person who prays one way and lives another is a fool. It is the same as the person who hears God's Word idly without any conviction. When one is convicted by God's Word—of sin, of Christ's right-eousness, and of the Devil's defeat—they make a beginning in acting accordingly. Faith convicts the whole life, not only the ears or the mind or the desires a person pours out to God. Heart, tongue, and hand should act in harmony. *Lord, make me effective for the good of my neighbor. Amen.*

WED

SCRIPTURE: Jeremiah 29:11-14—I Will Hear You

Be sure to read back to verse 10 for the context of this popular but often misused verse. God spoke it first to Judah, whom He was sending into exile. We ought to use it likewise to comfort ourselves in the midst of affliction. The point is this: God promises to hear. It is His promise—not our heartfeltness—that causes Him to hear. Just as He hears, so also He in His good time restores fortunes, causes us to fare well, and works good for us. He works all things—even affliction—together for our good. That is why we pray to Him confidently. Lord, confirm me in hope and preserve me in Your goodness. Amen.

THU

SCRIPTURE: Mark 16:14-20—The Ascension of our Lord

We remember the Lord's ascension today. Mark includes this great comment, however, that as the apostles preached, it was the Lord—not them—who worked with them and confirmed their message. Ascension is not the feast of our Lord's absence from us; it is the celebration of His great coronation and exaltation at the right hand of God's majesty. Christ, risen as a man, is elevated to authority with the Father. As a result, He is able to be with His Church in all places. His presence is not seen as it was in Galilee; it is heard in His Word and tasted in His Supper. *Ascended Lord, rule Your Church! Amen.*

FRI

SCRIPTURE: Romans 8:24-28—The Good Kind of Groaning

Of course you don't know what or how to pray. Who knows what is best but God? What a comfort, then, that the Holy Spirit—who has access to the inner council of the Holy Trinity—intercedes for us and prays always according to God's perfect will! This gives us courage to offer our prayers, weak as they may be. It gives us confidence that we may add "Amen" to them, since the Spirit prays far deeper than even our best words and efforts. And we found it on this will, which is by no means hidden even if it remains mysterious to us: He wills our good. Lord, hear my prayers in the Spirit for my good. Amen.

SAT

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 124—An Impossible "If"

Everyone must join in this Psalm. Do you see it? "Let Israel now say..." Imagine all of the things that could have happened to you. Usually we imagine, instead, all of the things that might or will happen to us. But the Psalm is a sort of correction for our worry. It places all of these under that ridiculous category, "if the Lord were not on our side." If the Lord didn't work all things together for our good. There is no such "if." He made heaven and earth. He redeemed us. Christ is proof that He is on our side. He is our Help, let all now say it. Blessed be Your Name, Lord, for You have spared us. Amen.
