## Around the Word Devotions + the week of May 3-9, 2020

#### THEME OF THE WEEK: He is Risen to Give Us Believing Joy

Believing joy is more than a feeling, and thank God that it is. To equate joy with a feeling or an emotion is to equate joy with something that is subjective and movable. While joy might accompany happiness and pleasure, there is no promise that it will. In fact, we may very well suffer at different points in our life, but that does not mean that we have no joy. Our joy is contingent on the objective fact that Christ is risen from the grave and has won the victory over sin, death, and the devil for us. Our joy is connected to the objective fact that He gives that victory to us in time and space through Word and Sacrament. This may bring a smile to my face, or I may still wail with tears, but the joy of Christ's victory means that neither of those emotions affect my reality.

## SUN

#### SCRIPTURE: John 16:16-24—Sorrow and Joy

Our joy is not a feeling, it is an objective fact. In our text, Jesus is speaking to His disciples on the night that He is betrayed. They will have great sorrow. Everything that they thought was real will be seemingly dashed to pieces. In a fallen world with sin, disease, death, and pandemic it seems as if sorrow is inevitable. But we do not live as those who have no hope. We do not live as those who have no joy. Our joy is not connected to our present situation, however good or bad it might be. Our joy is connected to Christ: His cross, His resurrection, His ascension. We do not see the Lord, but He is ascended with all things placed under His feet. We have Him in His Word, promising us that what He has, we have too. It may not seem like it today or tomorrow, but Christ is still risen and ascended, and that means the world. Jesus, turn our sorrow to joy. Amen.



### SCRIPTURE: Isaiah 40:25-31—Strength To The Faint

There is a bigness to God, a bigness that is unfathomable. Isaiah speaks about it in our text. "Who is like God?" he asks. And then He shows how big God is by explaining how much He has created. All of that is true, but none of that is of any comfort unless that big, bold, powerful God is for you. That is the last part of Isaiah 40. God is for you. Not only may you take comfort in the fact that God is bigger than anything that may dismay you, but while you are being dismayed by the things of this fallen world He increases your strength and mounts you up on eagles wings. All of that is great flowery language, but how? How does He do this for you? Here it is not His bigness, but His meekness. The cross is given to you in simple things like His Word, water, bread and wine. Holy One, when we become faint renew our strength in the cross of Christ. Amen.

#### SCRIPTURE: 1 Peter 2:11-20—Enduring Sorrows

A Christian is the most free of any man and subject to none, while at the same time being the greatest servant and subject to all. This is the seemingly conflicting state of our affairs that Peter is speaking about. Christ has freed us from bondage under anything, and so as free men we willingly place ourselves in subjection to our neighbor for his good and benefit. We realize that the government is God's tool to protect the innocent and punish the evildoers. Thanks be to God! Let us subject ourselves to them for the good of our neighbor. The whole servant-mentality is easy for Christians to speak about academically. The hard part is when a corona-infested world makes us put it into practice. Our natural reaction is to push back. But if Christ made Himself a servant to all, shouldn't His body endure suffering as well? Suffering Servant, may we serve others as You serve us. Amen
