Around the Word Devotions + the week of November 8-14, 2020

THEME OF THE WEEK: Resisting the Unforgiving Flesh

The Lord begins work so well it cannot but continue in those He has saved. Christians do good works. We love as we have been loved. We forgive as we have been forgiven. This is not a handoff or a tag team. This is God's work being done so powerfully in our persons that it conforms the protests of our flesh to His will. Christians are made holy in the death of Jesus. Holy people do holy works. Holy people love the Law because it is a good gift from the Giver. Holy people look to the Holy One to bring these works from beginning to completion.

SUN

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 18:23-35 All Forgiveness Comes from the Cross

"Forgive as you have been forgiven." To forgive is to wipe clean the debt. We pray it. "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." It's hard to pray this with sincerity because sin's effects in this life are profound. How does it feel when someone sins against you? How eager are you to forgive? The joy of the parable is seeing that God made forgiveness possible by first forgiving us. Jesus wants us to see that all forgiveness comes from the cross. The King's act of mercy gives the servant freedom, even freedom to stop counting the debts of others against him. O LORD, Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. Amen.

MON

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 119:169-176 The Alpha and the Omega of Good

Everything starts and ends with God. Our cries reach Him because He first graciously came to us. From that comes salvation. He descends to deliver sinners. He teaches us His precepts, and we sing them back because He gave us faith to trust in them. Even when we sin and go astray, He seeks His servants to give us His torah again. Look to God's Word first and last. It is certain. Your works are stained by sin, but, according to His Word, your God seeks to save sinners through his Son's death, resurrection, and life-giving promise.

O LORD, descend to us and hear our cries and answer us in Your mercy, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

TUE

SCRIPTURE: Philippians 1:3-11 He Who Began it Will Bring It to Completion

He who begun the good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ. Love one another. Grow in knowledge and discernment. Approve what is excellent. Be pure and blameless. All these are the works of the Spirit, Who began them and Who will bring them to completion. The Lord Jesus Christ already said your redemption is finished. That promise will sustain our faith until the last day when the same Lord returns to judge the works He has begun and now brings to completion.

O LORD, Send us Your Holy Spirit and keep us in the holy catholic faith now and until the day of the Lord. Amen.

WED

SCRIPTURE: Deuteronomy 7:9-11 Love the Word and Work of the Lord

To love God is to keep and treasure His Word, both Law and Gospel. We keep a Law we cannot perfectly keep and are sustained by a hope it has been fulfilled for us by Christ. God is faithful towards us. Do not be negligent with these commands, but have care, for they are given for your good. A hatred of God rejects His words and works. To hate the torah is also to hate the God who gives it as a gift. To hate your neighbor is to hate the One who died and rose to save sinners from destruction.

O LORD, fix our eyes upon Your statutes, that in faith we may love You and cherish what You call good, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 18:1-20 Not A Checklist

Christians say "Matthew 18" to each other whenever as if it were a checklist to work through in order to get rid of someone. This chapter is about gaining your brother, not losing him. This chapter is about the Good Shepherd seeking the lost. It is about Jesus redeeming sinners and promising to dwell with us in a way that actually makes it possible for us to dwell with each other. The goal isn't to bind sins, but to loose them. That's why Jesus spent so much time preaching the Father's mercy to gentiles and tax collectors.

O LORD, as You sent Your Son, Jesus Christ, to be our Good Shepherd, who gathers sinners, unite us in the same forgiveness of sins, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

FRI

SCRIPTURE: Ephesians 4:30-32 Sealed to Good

To grieve the Holy Spirit is to deny forgiveness, through which you were sealed for salvation. You can stand unafraid on the last day because you are forgiven. Do not treat your neighbor as if Christ did not die for sinners. It is a sin against the faith planted in your heart by the Spirit. To believe Christ did not die for sinners is to deny that He died for you. Do not grieve the Holy Spirit Who, by forgiving your sins in baptism, sealed you for the day of redemption. O LORD, keep us from grieving the Holy Spirit and hating Your mercy. Help us to rejoice in mercy not just toward ourselves, but toward each other, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
