Around the Word Devotions + the week of September 16-22. 2018

THEME OF THE WEEK: Perseverance in Glorifying God

Jesus is the resurrection and the life, the hope for all doomed to die. Jesus is the righteousness and holiness of God, the hope of all sinners. Jesus is the kindness of God, the Friend of sinners, the good Physician, the one who kills to make alive, the One who was killed on the cross to make us alive. This week's devotions are full of beautiful passages that bring us Christ our Savior and Friend, and the joy of knowing that He is alive for us.

SUN

SCRIPTURE: Luke 7:11-17, When Jesus Says "Arise", You Arise

This is a stunning scene: two crowds, meeting at the city gate. One is a funeral procession, led by a mourning mother. The other is the crowd of Jesus' disciples, led by Jesus Himself. They meet at the gate. It would be customary, and good manners, for Jesus and His disciples to step aside and let the funeral procession through; but Jesus stands His ground. He stops the march of death; that is what He has come to do. He says to the mourning woman, "That's enough crying," and He reaches out and touches the coffin, and the boy wakes up from the sleep of death. How wonderful! A little taste of the last day when Jesus will

wake all His people, and give to us eternal life. Lord Jesus, come soon, wake the dead, bring the resurrection to eternal life. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 119, sixteenth part (AYIN v121-128), "O Love Your Commandments More than Gold"

It matters what we love, what we delight in. Our sinful flesh is inclined to delight in all sorts of things, perhaps most especially in wealth. But David teaches us what we ought to delight in. He sets our affections straight. "Therefore, I love Your commandments more than gold, yes, that fine gold!" God's Word, His will, His law, His commandments, His promises, these are our greatest treasure. When we have these we have life eternal, and wisdom to live here below. Fine gold can buy food and clothing, but only God's Word carries us through death to eternal life. O Lord, sanctify my desires and delights, so that I treasure above all things Your words and commandments. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Ephesians 3:13-21, That You Would Know the Unknowable Love

This text gives us insight into how Paul prayed for the church, and what a prayer! There is too much to talk about in a paragraph, so I'd like simply to point to the mystery that Paul refers to in 3:19, that you would "know the love of Christ which passes knowledge." Did you catch that? Paul prays that they would know what can't be known: the love of Christ. His love for us is so profound that we cannot comprehend it. We cannot sound its depths or see its heights. Only by the Holy Spirit enlightening our eyes can we begin to know that love. O Holy Spirit, strengthen us in our inner man so that we would be able to know the love of Christ that passes knowledge, and that we would be filled with the fullness of God. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Deuteronomy 32:39, 40, God Kills and Makes Alive

I, even I, am He, and there is no God besides Me; I kill and I make alive." It seems like the order is wrong. We live first, then we die. Cradle then grave. But the Lord does things in the other direction. First we die, then we live. This is the proper order of Law and Gospel. The Lord slays us with the Law, showing our sins and the wrath that we deserve. Then He lifts us up out of the grave with the promise of the Gospel. Faith and the forgiveness of sins is a resurrection. Baptism is a resurrection, a new, second and eternal life. The Lord kills first, and then gives life, because the life He gives will never come to an end. *Heavenly*

Father, grant me Your Holy Spirit, so that I look to You, the only true God, for life and salvation. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: John 11:19-45, The Tears of God

"Jesus wept." This is the shortest verse in the Bible (John 11:35), but it speaks of great things. First, of the love of Jesus for Lazarus. "See how He loved him" (11:36). This love of Jesus not only brings Lazarus out of the grave. This love will put Jesus into the grave for us! And these tears of Jesus, the tears of God, teach us that it is not a sin to mourn or to cry. Jesus, who did all things well, mourned the death of Lazarus. We do well when we mourn the death of those we love, even as we know that Jesus has them in His care. Jesus was a Man of Sorrows, and He teaches how to mix our tears with hope and our sadness with faith. Lord Jesus Christ, give us strength to do the good work of mourning, and bring us at last to the resurrection where there will be no more tears.

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 9:9-13: St. Matthew's Day, The Doctor is Looking for the Sick Tax collectors were the worst. They would cheat the people, steal from them, and take all they wanted. They were the worst of sinners, and this tax collector: Matthew, knew it. He knew his sin, his guilt, his shame, his damnable wretchedness. So when Jesus says, "Those who are well have no need of a physician," Matthew knows just what He is talking about. Matthew needs a Savior, and he has one. "Follow Me!" Jesus says to Matthew, "you don't belong to sin anymore, you belong to Me." We, too, belong to Jesus, the doctor who finds the sick, the Savior who has found us sinners. O Lord, thank You for Your mercy and kindness to Matthew, to me, and to all sinners. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 36: How Precious is Your Lovingkindness, O God!

"Precious" is a delightful word, a delight in something tender, a joy in something wonderful and good. King David teaches us to pray, "How precious is Your lovingkindness, O God" (Psalm 36:7). God's lovingkindness is His mercy and goodness and love all bound up in one. It is the love that drives Jesus to the cross, the love that wins and delivers forgiveness of sins to us sinners. His lovingkindness saves us, delivers us, and gives us life. It is precious above all precious things. "Therefore the children of men put their trust under the shadow of Your wings." O Lord, continue Your lovingkindness to those who know You, and Your righteousness to the upright in heart. Amen.
